Important Notes

- **Showmanship is required for ALL animal species exhibited or premium money and eligibility to sell in the auction will be forfeited.**
- **Poultry exhibits must be hatched after January 1st.**
- **Ear tag requirements for auction animals.**
 - **All auction beef and lambs must have an official 840 identification or scrapie identification tag. Tags can be purchased from a veterinarian.**
 - **All auction hogs must be ear notched and tagged with common ear tags. Ear tag and ear notch must match.**
 - **Bloomer Fair will not be providing ear tags.**
 - **See page 7 for auction animal requirements.**
- **Every exhibitor who registers any combination of ten entries in the art, crafts and farm products exhibit (pages 15-35) will be entered in a drawing for \$100.00 dollars sponsored by the Bloomer FFA Alumni. Exhibitors must enter their own name at time of registration on Thursday to be eligible. Does not include livestock entries.**
- **Rabbit and poultry showmanship judging, judge will be available at your convenience from 8am-1pm on judging day Friday.**
- **Barn Space - Due to the increase of interest in participation in the Bloomer Fair and Meat Auction, youth in the Bloomer and New Auburn School Districts will have first priority for barn space.**

GENERAL RULES FOR EXHIBITS OF LIVESTOCK AND POULTRY



1. Exhibiting of dairy and beef cattle is open to members of the 4-H, FFA, or other clubs.
2. Exhibitors must be caring for animals and keeping records on their animals. All exhibitors must be registered.
3. Exhibitors should use individual utensils in caring for animals
4. **Bedding to be furnished by the exhibitor.**
5. All stalls/pens must be kept in good condition. The barns will be regularly inspected and exhibits must be kept neat at all times. Failure to do this will forfeit any premium won. Judges will not award premiums to exhibitors who are not worthy.
6. Bulls may be entered by exhibitors 14 years & over.
7. Entries of livestock must be registered with Darren Swartz or Jackie Johnson on or before the last Friday in July. Phone: 568-2800, ext. 4171 or 4160. Exhibitors are limited to 4 dairy or beef exhibits(breeding stock and market) and 5 poultry exhibits and 5 rabbit exhibits.
8. All health and identification regulations as stated in the Northern Wisconsin State Fair book will apply to the Bloomer fair. If a copy is needed, contact Mr. Darren Swartz or Ms. Jackie Johnson.
9. All Beef and Dairy exhibits require permanent, individual identification (ie. Metal ear tag, brand, registration papers, or tattoo). Additional information is needed if the animal did not originate in Wisconsin.
10. Sheep exhibits require an official scrapie ear tag on all sexually intact sheep and all other sheep over 12 months of age.
11. Goat exhibits require an official scrapie tag or other official scrapie identification.
12. All Poultry and waterfowl exhibits must originate from flocks designated as U.S. Pullorum-Typhoid Clean or NPIP Affiliate flock and accompanied by a NPIP certificate or originate from a Wisconsin Tested Flock or Wisconsin Associate Flock and be accompanied by an enrollment certificate. Birds not meeting this requirement may be exhibited with a negative test for pullorum-typhoid conducted within 90 days of exhibition and identified with a leg or wing band.
13. Equine exhibits must have documentation of a negative coggins test conducted with the last year.
14. Exhibitors will be required to supply a Livestock Premise ID number for animal exhibits.

GENERAL RULES FOR ALL ENTRIES

1. The junior division of this fair is open to any Bloomer area boy or girl being a member of the 4-H, FFA, FCCLA, Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, VICA, FBLA, or any other youth group members doing equivalent work. A member may enter any junior exhibit in any area regardless of the individual projects carried in 4-H or FFA. (i.e. – if a member wants to show a dairy calf but is not in the dairy project, that is OK) All clubs having exhibitors will be asked to share in supervising.
2. Only one entry per premium number allowed by each exhibitor. All exhibits must be the result of the labor of the person exhibiting. Records on each entry must be available if asked for.
3. Exhibitors can participate in the junior fair until one year after high school graduation. If an exhibitor graduates in 2026, Bloomer fair 2027 would be their last eligible fair to exhibit.
4. **All exhibits must have been completed, built, grown, harvested after last year's fair, unless otherwise noted.**
5. Premiums will be paid only on animals and articles listed in this book.
6. Livestock and poultry exhibits must remain in place until 4:00 PM, Sunday, and must be removed by 6:00 PM. All other exhibits must remain in place until 4:00 PM, Sunday, and must be removed by 6:00 PM, Sunday. Market swine and sheep will be hauled to slaughter Monday after the fair.
REMOVAL BEFORE WILL MEAN FORFEITURE OF PREMIUM MONEY
7. A modified Danish System of placing will be used with approximately 1/3 firsts, 1/3 seconds and 1/3 thirds.

REGISTRATION PLEASE NOTE

All exhibitors in the Junior Fair Division must be members of 4-H, FFA, FCCLA, Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, VICA, FBLA, or any other youth group. All exhibitors in the Junior and Open Class Division must fill out a registration envelope at the front desk of the exhibit building before entering exhibits. **REGISTRATION SHOULD BE DONE ONLY ONCE.**

LIVESTOCK AUCTION

- Bloomer Fair livestock sale is open to Bloomer area youth 4-H and FFA groups. Members from the following youth groups are invited to participate in the Bloomer Fair livestock sale: Bloomer FFA, New Auburn FFA, Duncan Creek 4-H, Hay Creek Ramblers 4-H, Mile Corner 4-H, Woodmohr 4-H, Howard Wheaton 4H.
- The following species will be sold at the auction: Sheep, Swine and Beef. Exhibitors can identify more than one market animal but are limited to weighing, exhibiting and selling one animal in the auction.
- YQCA Certification will be required for all exhibitors selling an animal in the auction. This will be required annually. <https://yqcaprogram.org/>
- All meat animal projects need to be tagged. Beef and lambs must have an official 840 identification tag or scrapies identification tag. Hogs must be ear notched and be tagged with a common livestock tag. Ear notch and tag must match. 840/scrapies tags can be purchased from a veterinarian. Hogs tags can be any form of ear tag.
- Livestock Weights: Swine minimum of 230 lbs, maximum of 320 lbs, swine over 320 lbs will not be eligible for sale. Beef minimum of 1000 lbs. Market lamb minimum weight of 100 lbs. Exhibitors with swine over 320 lbs will only receive payment for 320 lbs.
- Sale auction will be based on live weights determined on fair entry day/weigh-in day.
- 3% commission will be charged on meat animals sold at the auction. This money will stay with the Bloomer Fair livestock auction project to pay for expenses associated with the auction.
- Meat locker space is reserved at Bob's Processing and Lott's-a-Meat in Bloomer. Swine and Lambs will be processed Monday after the fair. Beef will be processed the two Tuesdays after the fair. All Beef will be processed at Bob's Processing. All lambs and swine will be processed at Lott's-a-meat.
- Beef exhibitors are responsible for transporting their animals to slaughter. Transportation for swine and lambs will be provided.
- Any market animals that exhibit unsafe behavior or show evidence of minimal work exhibited by the exhibitor will be dismissed from the fair and will not be eligible for auction.
- Exhibitors must be an active member of the designated FFA and 4-H group within the Bloomer Community and in good standing in order to be eligible for sale auction.

DRESS-AN-ANIMAL COMPETITION

Any exhibitor showing any animal at the fair is invited to enter an exhibit in the Dress-an-animal competition. A short narrative describing the outfit or telling a story to go along with the animal should be provided to the ring announcer. This competition will take place immediately following the beef show. Exhibitors may work individually or as a team.

DEPT. 2 - BEEF (Junior Division)

Exhibitors are limited to 4 animal entries in Dairy and/or Beef in total.

Beef Cattle Age Divisions

The following age divisions shall apply for all beef cattle exhibits. The “exhibit year” refers to the current calendar year in which the show is held.

1. **Junior Calf**
A junior calf is one born on or after January 1 of the exhibit year. The calf must be at least four (4) months old at the time of exhibition.
2. **Senior Calf**
A senior calf is one born between September 1 and December 31 of the year preceding the exhibit year.
3. **Summer Yearling**
A summer yearling is one born between May 1 and August 31 of the year preceding the exhibit year.
4. **Junior Yearling**
A junior yearling is one born between January 1 and March 31 of the year preceding the exhibit year.
5. **Spring Yearling**
A spring yearling is one born between April 1 and April 30 of the year preceding the exhibit year.
6. **Senior Yearling**
A senior yearling is one born between September 1 and December 31 of the second year preceding the exhibit year.
7. **Two-Year-Old or Older Cow**
A two-year-old or older cow is one born before September 1 of the second year preceding the exhibit year and that has calved within the past year.
